# **OECD Adult Skills Survey 2013**

Almost **18%** of Irish adults are at or below level 1 of literacy – 525,000 people. 25% of Irish

adults are at or

below level 1 of

numeracy-

754,000 people.

42% of Irish adults score at or below Level 1 on the problem solving scale – 825,000 people.



# A question of critical mass

Adult literacy budget in Ireland 2013 is **€29M** and

54,682 attended adult literacy services in ETBs.

- About 10% of those at or below PIAAC level 1 literacy.
- Tuition model is mainly 2 hours per week for about 30 weeks
- Blended learning is not always used.

Further education and training budget in Ireland €900M

**270,000** places in further education and training.



# NALA advocate 4 policies to engage learners

- Embed literacy into other policies e.g. Health, Activation, Youth and Digital strategies.
- Integrate relevant literacy & numeracy into all learning.
- 3. Provide more flexible services to meet needs.
- 4. Promotional, awareness and advertising campaigns.



# More flexible services

• Blended learning, self directed and distance learning are now key

to literacy and basic learning policies.

# **Recognition of Prior Learning - RPL**

- Integral part of <u>www.writeon.ie</u>.
- Initial, formative and summative assessment against national standards.
- Provides RPL at Irish NFQ levels 2 & 3.
- Only RPL system at these levels in Ireland.
- Example: Activation project for young long term unemployed used RPL to support learning and qualifications.

# **Blended learning**

#### NALA experience suggests benefits:

- For learners:
  - Facilitates learning in different ways and styles.
  - Learners may require more support than you can traditionally provide.
  - Integrates literacy and numeracy into other learning needs.
- For providers:
  - Expands learning time and optimises learning and tutoring resources
  - Supports learning to meet the needs of a particular learner.
  - Shares content rather than reinvents the wheel every time.
  - Provides for certification and RPL
- For policy makers
  - Can provide greater outcomes and achievement
  - Optimises resources

#### Models of Blended Learning using writeon.ie in Ireland





#### Model 1 Tallaght Probation Service

- Level 3 educational programme for 18-35 year olds.
- Use a 'pen and paper' approach when doing group work.
- Learners work independently on writeon.ie with some tutor input.





- Young people are familiar with immediacy of technology.
- Key benefits are the ability to;
  - diagnose individual learning needs,
  - quickly develop individualised working plans,
  - maintain greater levels of motivation,
  - ensures privacy and allows learners to work at individual pace,
  - achieve accreditation,
  - address and deal with behavioural issues in the classroom.



#### Unistance Learning Service Model 1 Tallaght Probation Service

"This is probably one of the few times they've felt a sense of achievement in years. They particularly like using the pull and drag facility, the fact that you can click on something and 'ding, ding' numbers are coming up and that you can get through some exercises in under thirty seconds and then you're done. They think 'it's cool.'" *Blended Learning tutor* 

"I've seen guys coming out of here beaming, you know, after twenty minutes they're literally beaming. They ask if they can go on and do the next exercise. It's really important here, I can't emphasise how important it has been. It has changed lives here. I really mean that." *Blended Learning tutor* 





#### Model 2 ESOL Blended Learning Project

- Carried out at the request of Limerick ESOL Partnership.
- Focus of project was learners' use of <u>www.writeon.ie</u>
- Took place over 10 week period and involved 41 ESOL learners.
- Primary aim was to highlight benefits, to learners, providers and organisations of using <u>www.writeon.ie</u> as part of blended learning approach to the tuition of ESOL learners





#### Model 2 ESOL Blended Learning Project

- ESOL learners keen to learn outside of classroom time <u>www.writeon.ie</u> provided an opportunity to extend learning time.
- Good literacy resource for literacy and language development
- Reported increased confidence in a number of learning situations.
- Increased confidence level when expressing themselves in English.
- Encouraged independent study.
- Encouraged work towards accreditation





#### Model 3 An Cosán

- Group of learners with different needs.
- Tutor conducts own needs analysis with individuals.
- Learners and tutor negotiate which awards to work on.
- Learners work on own, supporting each other as needed.
- Tutor addresses issues individually in one-to-one or at front of class if issues recurring.
- Learners begin with writeon.ie before moving on to other ICT work.
- Peer support was a large part of the class.
- Learners work independently at home or in their local library.





#### NALA's Blended Learning Project 2010

- 12 centres
- Using 'traditional' approach
  - One-to-one, Group
  - Books, DVDs, CD-Roms, TV, tasks, etc
- Combining it with <u>www.writeon.ie</u>
  - To expand capacity one tutor, many one-to-ones for example
  - To offer independent study options
  - To introduce computers
  - To offer accreditation at level 2
